# SF186: Visual Language II

# **Course Description:**

Visual Language II is a course devoted to a student's progress toward a more sustained and independent inquiry into topics of personal interest. The course will include three projects followed by an independent final project of your choosing. These projects will be written down, documented and developed in a learning contract. The class time will be divided between class critiques and individual meetings with the professor.

# **Expectations:**

You are expected to develop a professional attitude in all aspects of this course. This includes, not only fulfilling the course requirements, but also demonstrating respect, support and cooperative effort toward your fellow students during class discussions and critiques. You are expected to show respect to you workspace, materials and equipment and to communicate with me about any problems you are having with any aspect of this course.

When you are absent, you are accountable for the information given out in class the day you were absent. You will be responsible for getting this information from other students who attended the class that week. I will hand out a copy of fellow students' names, email addresses and telephone numbers [with the students' consent]. You are also expected to make regular backups of your work. Each student is responsible for having all supplies required of this course. Check the website and your email regularly. I will be emailing you any updates whenever they happen.

#### Grading is based on the following:

<u>Attendance:</u> Class attendance is absolutely required. Three absences will result in automatic failure. Punctuality counts. If you are over 10 min. late, you will be marked tardy. Being tardy twice equals one absence. In addition, coming to in-class lab days unprepared will result in an absence.

• 30% In-class lab Assignments: Some class sessions will have a lab objective that students are required to complete before the end of class. Details about the day's assignments will be given at the start of class on that day.

<u>Assignments & Critiques:</u> Four major assignments, each with a critique day, will be described in project sheets throughout the semester. You will earn grades for each assignment during the semester and for each critique based on the following criteria:

- 25% Production: Are you meeting all deadlines and project specifications?
- 25% Quality: Are you meeting basic professional technical standards? Do you effectively convey your intended message to your audience? What is the purpose of any ambiguities you may employ?
- <u>20% Participation</u>: Active participation in all critiques and class discussions is expected. This includes completion of all the reading assignments.

#### **Studio Assignments:**

<u>Clarity of concept:</u> Each project must not only reflect an understanding of the assignment but also show innovation in solving conceptual and creative problems.

<u>Innovative Technical Execution:</u> For most of you, this class will be an entirely new way of creating art. You must work outside your comfort zone and take chances while making your projects.

Please note: Any assignment that fails to meet these expectations will not be accepted and will have to be re-done. (see below)

# **Assignments:**

<u>Deadlines:</u> All work is due on the specified deadline. Late or incomplete work will not be accepted. If you are to miss a class, you may send in your work with a classmate for it to count as being on time. Expect to work at least one hour outside of class for each hour in class. All projects for critique in class are expected to be "presentation ready" BEFORE the start of class.

<u>Insufficient Work:</u> Work that is insufficient will be returned to you to be re-done. You should re-work your projects based on feedback from your in-class critique; therefore, it is a good idea to make notes on the feedback that you are getting from classmates. The deadline for re-do's is the next scheduled class meeting.

Writing assignments should be written in Microsoft Word, be sure to spell-check. Cheating will not be tolerated in any instance. MassArt's academic honesty guidelines will be upheld.
